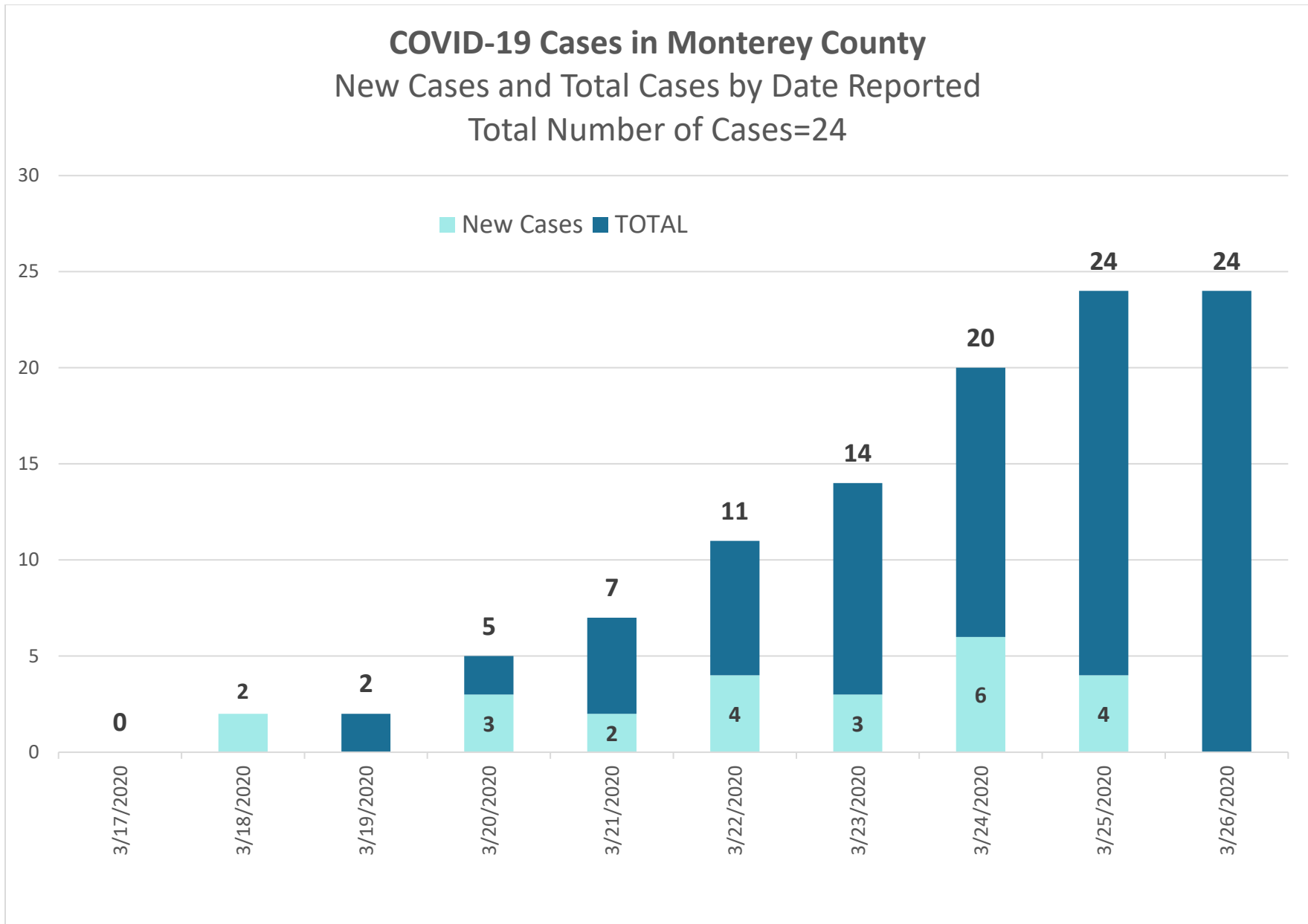

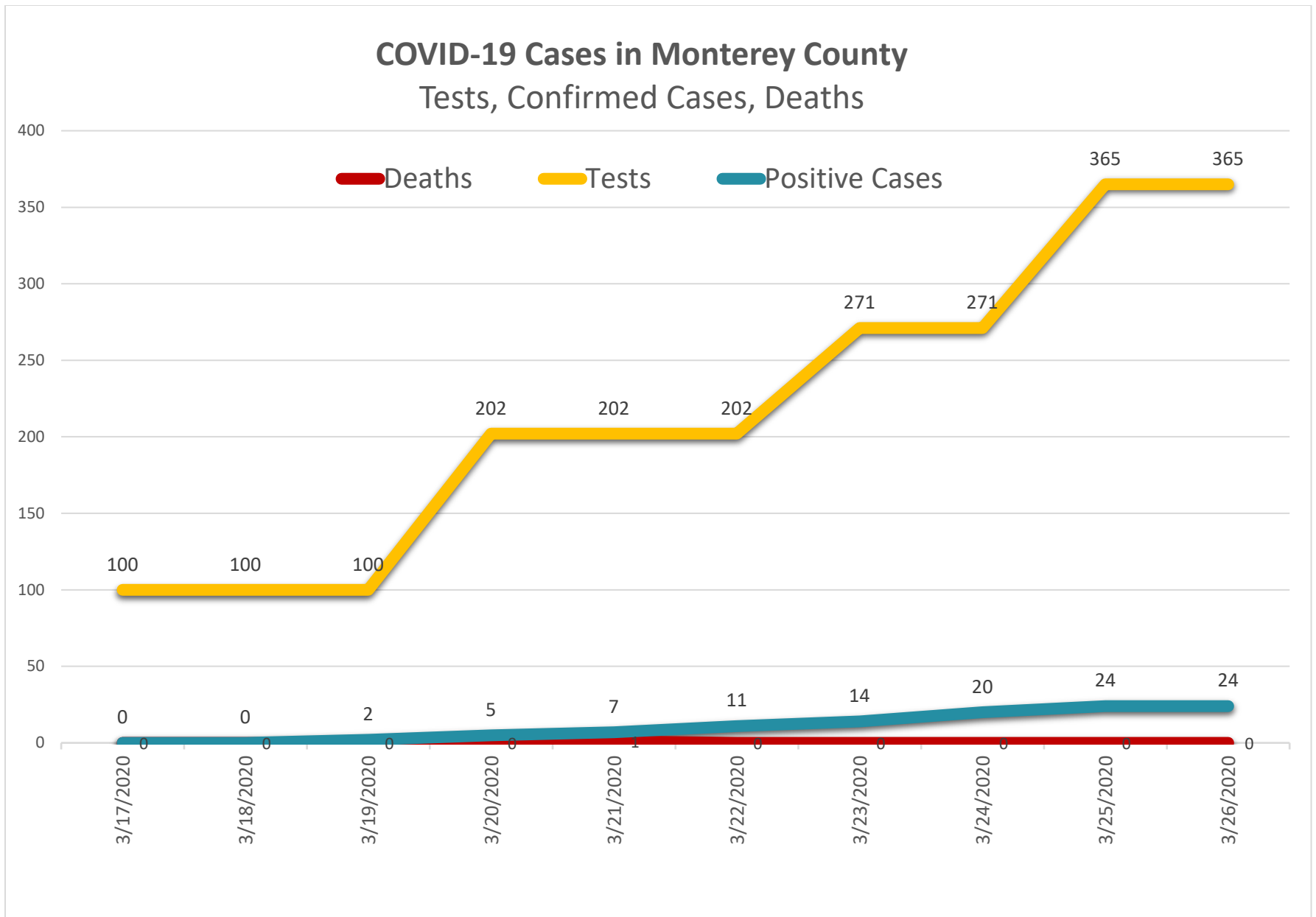

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- March 21, 2020 – First death due to complications from COVID-19 in Monterey County.
- March 19, 2020 - Governor Newsom issues a Shelter In Place Order to protect the health and well-being of all Californians and to establish consistency across the state in order to slow the spread of COVID-19.
- March 18, 2020 – Monterey County Op Area EOC elevated activation level to Level 2.
- March 18, 2020 - Monterey County Jail Visitation Suspended
- March 17, 2020 – City of Salinas and Sand City proclaim the existence of a local emergency.
- March 17, 2020 – The County of Monterey Health Officer has issued a [Shelter-in-Place Order](#) effective at 12:01 a.m. on March 18, 2020 and will continue to be in effect until 11:59 p.m. on April 7, 2020, or until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer.
- [March 17, 2020 – First two confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Monterey County.](#)
- March 17, 2020 –The Counties of Marin, Contra Costa, Alameda, Santa Clara, San Mateo, Santa Cruz and San Francisco order a Shelter In Place beginning March 17, 2020.

- March 16, 2020 – Monterey County schools & libraries temporarily closed.
- March 13, 2020 –Diamond Princess Cruise Ship passengers quarantined in Asilomar Hotel, Pacific Grove while undergoing testing.
- March 13, 2020 – Cities of Seaside, Marina, Monterey, Carmel & Pacific Grove proclaim emergencies.
- March 13, 2020 – [President Declares a National Emergency.](#)

STATUS OF THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT

Monterey County is aware of the statewide Stay Home Executive Order announced by Governor Newsom this evening. County officials are reviewing the order to determine its impacts on Monterey County.

In the meantime, all residents are asked to continue to follow the current Shelter in Place Order until otherwise notified and continue to practice prevention methods to reduce the spread of respiratory illness and safeguard yourself and your family.

***** UPDATED*** Shelter in Place Reissued**

In light of the Governor's announcement of a state-wide Stay Home Order, Monterey County Health Officer Dr. Edward Moreno is reissuing his Shelter in Place Order that went into effect on Wednesday, March 18th. The only change being made to the order is to remove the end date of April 7th to align with the state's direction.

"Older adults are at greater risk of serious illness and death from COVID-19. It is imperative that all county residents adhere to my County Health Officer Shelter in Place Order and the statewide Stay Home Order. You should stay at home unless you need to access essential services or are a provider of essential services. In addition, all employers should identify solutions that allow employees to work from home," states Dr. Edward Moreno, Monterey County Health Officer.

The Monterey County Health Officer Order is consistent with the statewide order and orders issued by other Bay Area local Health Officers.

There is no difference between a "Shelter in Place" and "Stay at Home" order. They are different titles for the same important action to safeguard everyone in our community.

Monterey County Health Officials continue to work with state leaders to further clarify the statewide order and provide guidance on interpreting it locally. Local Health Officers may be more restrictive than the statewide order based on their unique needs as well as number of cases impacting each community. Monterey County's Order includes additional accommodations for essential agricultural services.

Monterey County Operational Area Emergency Operations Center

The Monterey County Operational Area Emergency Operations Center (EOC) has activated to Level 2 (partial) to support the Monterey County Health Department in preparing for and responding to COVID-19 (Coronavirus).

Level Two activation is an increase from Level Three. This activation level is used for emergencies that require more than a minimum staff but would not call for a full activation of all organization elements, or less than full staffing. The EOC Director, in conjunction with the General Staff, will demobilize functions or add additional staff to functions as necessary based upon event considerations. Representatives to the EOC from other agencies or jurisdictions may be required under Level Two to support functional area activations.
