## SITUATION SUMMARY

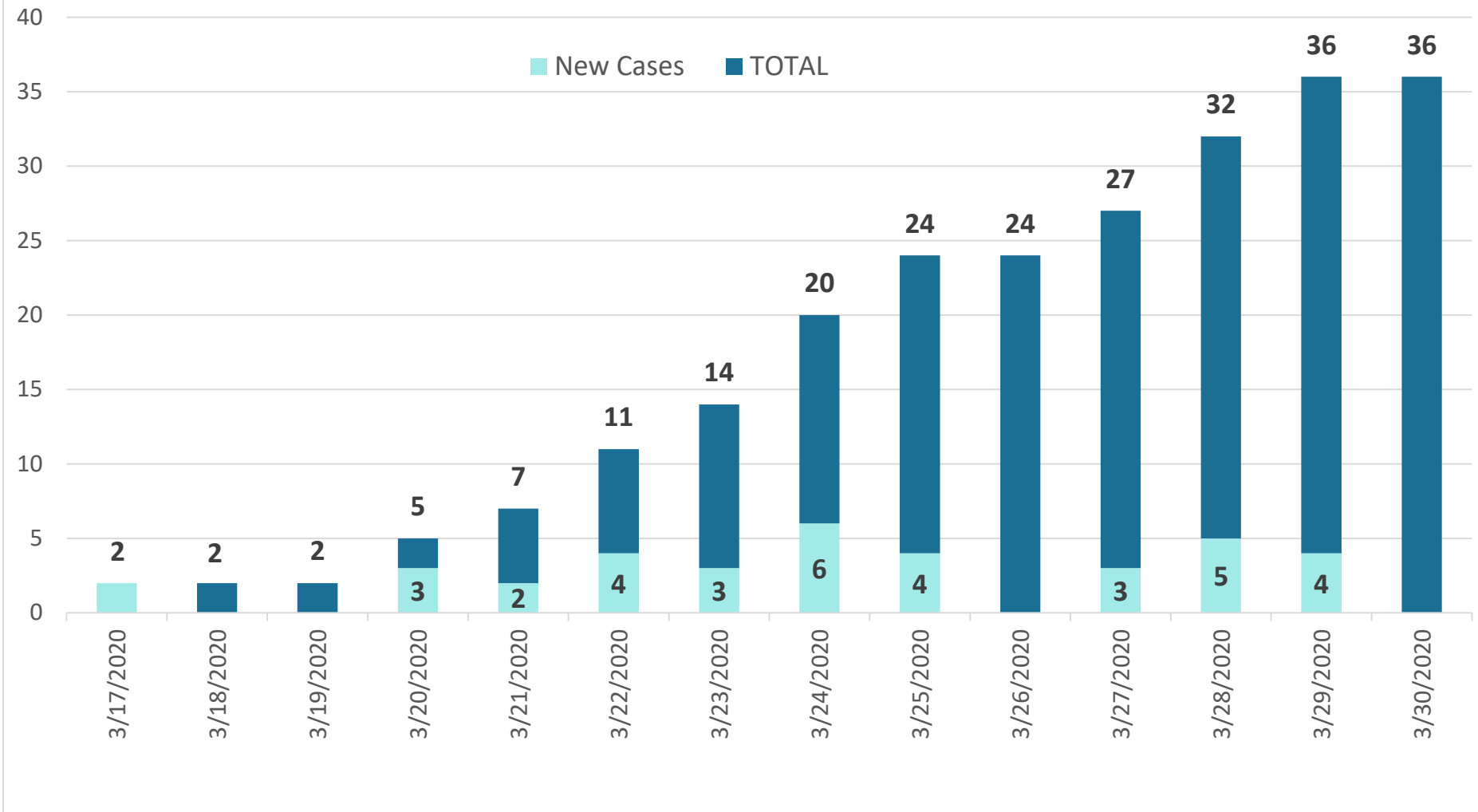
Novel Coronavirus is an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel (new) coronavirus that was first detected in China and which has now been detected in more than 100 locations internationally, including in the United States. The virus has been named “SARS-CoV-2” and the disease it causes has been named “coronavirus disease 2019” (abbreviated “COVID-19”). As of 11:00 am, March 29, 2020, there have been 36 confirmed cases and 452 tests of COVID-19 among Monterey County residents. This includes:

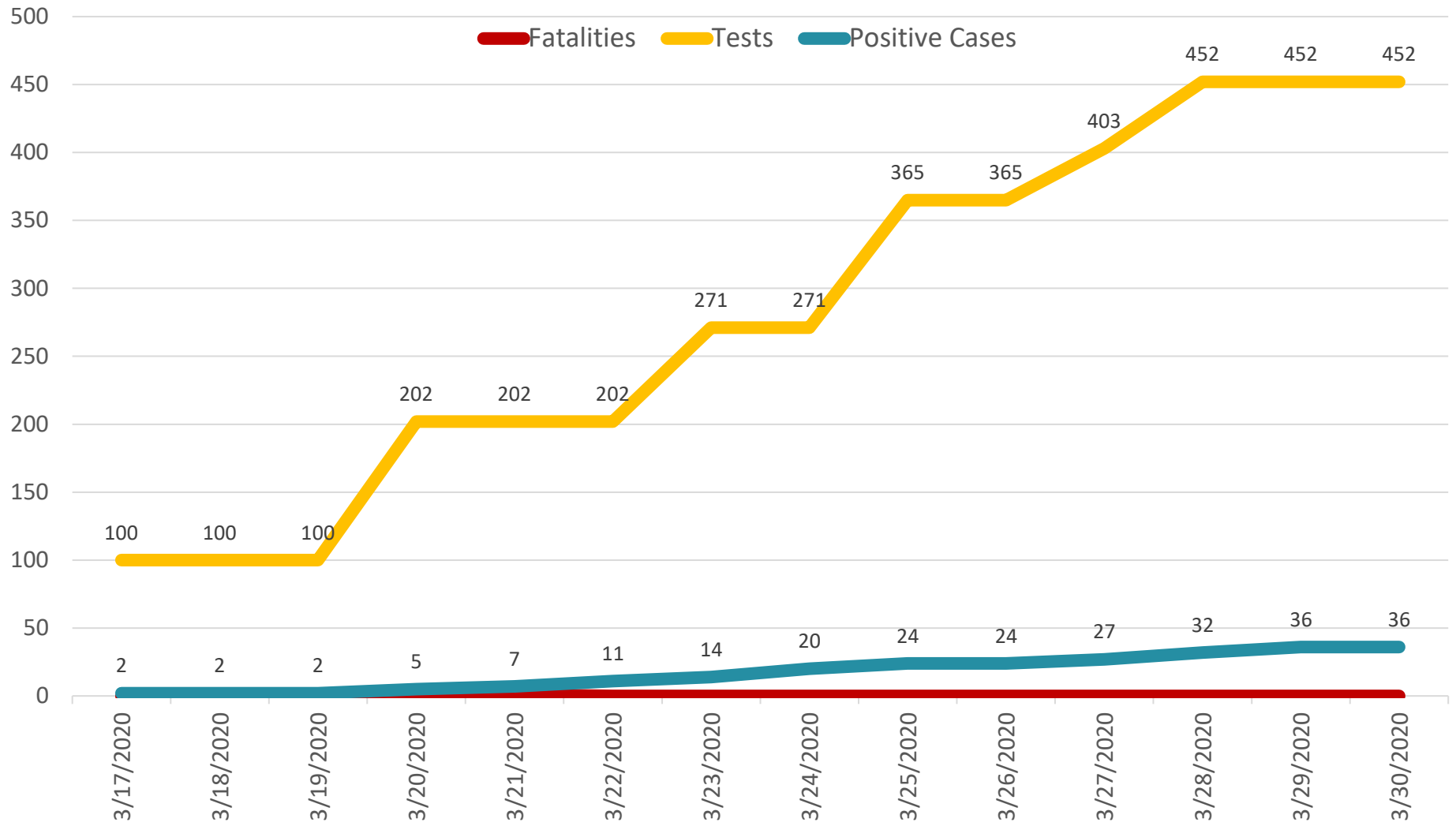
### COVID-19 Cases in Monterey County

## STATUS OF THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT

Monterey County is aware of the statewide Stay Home Executive Order announced by Governor Newsom this evening. County officials are reviewing the order to determine its impacts on Monterey County.

In the meantime, all residents are asked to continue to follow the current Shelter in Place Order until otherwise notified and continue to practice prevention methods to reduce the spread of respiratory illness and safeguard yourself and your family.

## DISASTER COST RECOVERY

**ACTION REQUIRED: Cities, Special Districts, and Private non-profit organizations must submit their own Requests for Public Assistance no later than close of business Wednesday, April 8, 2020. Please see the attached Application Fact Sheets for RPA submittal instructions.**

In accordance with section 502 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, eligible emergency protective measures taken to respond to the COVID-19 emergency at the direction or guidance of public health officials may be reimbursed under Category B of

### Eligible Applicants

- State Agencies
- Local Governments (e.g., Cities, Towns, Counties, etc.)
- Special Districts (e.g., School Districts, Sanitation Districts, Community Services Districts, etc.)
- Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments
- Private non-profit organizations which own or operate a private nonprofit facility as defined in 44 CFR, section 206.221(e)
- For-profit organizations are not eligible.

### Eligible Assistance

Under the COVID-19 Emergency Declaration, FEMA may provide assistance for emergency protective measures including, but not limited to, the following\*:

- Management, control and reduction of immediate threats to public health and safety:
  - Emergency Operation Center costs
  - Training specific to the declared event
  - Disinfection of eligible public facilities



- Technical assistance to state, tribal, territorial or local governments on emergency management and control of immediate threats to public health and safety
- Emergency medical care:
  - Non-deferrable medical treatment of infected persons in a shelter or temporary medical facility
  - Related medical facility services and supplies
  - Temporary medical facilities and/or enhanced medical/hospital capacity (for treatment when existing facilities are reasonably forecasted to become overloaded in the near term and cannot accommodate the patient load or to quarantine potentially infected persons)
  - Use of specialized medical equipment
  - Medical waste disposal
  - Emergency medical transport
- Medical sheltering (e.g. when existing facilities are reasonably forecasted to become overloaded in the near future and cannot accommodate needs)
  - All sheltering must be conducted in accordance with standards and/or guidance approved by HHS/CDC and must be implemented in a manner that incorporates social distancing measures

- Non-congregate medical sheltering is subject to prior approval by FEMA and is limited to that which is reasonable and necessary to address the public health needs of the event, is pursuant to the direction of appropriate public health officials and does not extend beyond the duration of the Public Health Emergency
- Household pet sheltering and containment actions related to household pets in accordance with CDC guidelines
- Purchase and distribution of food, water, ice, medicine, and other consumable supplies, to include personal protective equipment and hazardous material suits Movement of supplies and persons
- Security and law enforcement
- Communications of general health and safety information to the public
- Search and rescue to locate and recover members of the population requiring assistance
- Reimbursement for state, tribe, territory and/or local government force account overtime costs
